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Remember our friend, Augie Pabst

It is with deep sadness that we mark the passing of one of the Pabst Mansion's great and long-time supporters and benefactors. August Uihlein Pabst, Jr. died on October 9, 2024 at the age of 90. Augie was first and foremost a family man and dedicated friend, husband of Joan Pabst, father of James Pabst (Paisley), Christina Pabst, August U. Pabst III (Katherine), and Eugénie Pabst and loving grandfather of five grandchildren. For three decades, Augie made innumerable contributions to make the Pabst Mansion what it is today. He was immensely proud of the restoration work that had taken place and greatly looked forward to the future plans for its continued preservation. He was always a cheerful booster for the Mansion's staff, volunteers and fellow supporters, as he greatly appreciated all the efforts it took to maintain the Pabst Mansion as the successful museum that it is today.

Augie was born on November 25, 1933 to August U. Pabst, Sr. and Eugénie Bournique Pabst. The birth of their son was a welcome event to the couple who had been married on October 1, 1932. Tragically, Augie's father was killed in a plane crash just two weeks before the toddler turned a year old. Augie was raised by his mother and with the love and affection of his grandparents, Ida and Frederick Pabst, Jr., Captain Pabst's daughter-in-law and youngest son. His grandparents had a tremendous influence on the young Augie and he spent a considerable amount of time at their home. Woodbine, at Oconomowoc Lake and the adjacent Pabst Farms. His childhood experiences there would be carried throughout his lifetime.

After attending Deerfield Academy in Massachusetts and the University of Wisconsin, he would eventually purchase his grandparents' home and make it his own.

In 1956, he established Pabst Motors in Shorewood and specialized in a fine range of imported cars. He was also a dealer in the versatile Amphicar—a vehicle that could transverse land as well as water. One of his favorite stories related to when he took a potential buyer of an Amphicar out into the roiling waves of Lake Michigan on a particularly blustery day. The gentleman, petrified that he might not make it back to shore alive, turned and said to Augie, "If you get

me back safely, I'll buy the car." Augie of course did and a sale was made!

Augie's love of cars soon led to a legendary career in sports car racing, winning two National Championships, twice competing in the arduous 24 Hours of Le Mans as well as racing at Brands Hatch in the south of England. By the mid-1960s, Augie decided to focus his talents on the brewing industry. Being the great-grandson of Captain Frederick Pabst, head of the Pabst Brewing Company and August Uihlein, head of the Schlitz Brewing Company, perhaps this was inevitable. As in the Captain's day, a Pabst family member who was going to work at the brewery had to know and work in each of the departments and so Augie made his way through the plant. After graduating from the Siebel Institute of Brewing in Chicago, he joined the corporate side of the Pabst Brewing Company in 1966 and eventually rose to the position of Executive Vice-President and Member of the Board. After 17 years, Augie retired from Pabst

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in 1983 and the following year became President of Pabst Farms. He also resumed his racing career, this time in the vintage sports car arena. Augie and his beloved Scarab were perennial favorites at Elkhart Lake's Road America.

Throughout his life, Augie had a keen interest in history, especially that of the brewing industry and of Captain Pabst. In the mid-1970s, Augie played a key role in the fundraising efforts to save the Pabst Theater, a building much-loved by his grandparents. His commitment to preservation was not only in honor of those that came before him, but also due to his deep belief that the Pabst legacy should be saved for future generations.

By the mid-1990s, he began his involvement with the Pabst Mansion in earnest. While working at the brewing company, Augie discovered a locked trunk in a basement that had been cast aside.

Inside, he found bundles of Captain Pabst's papers that had been gathered together shortly after his death in 1904 and had been long forgotten. In early 1995, he asked if I would be interested in cataloguing the contents of the trunk. The contents have truly been a "Rosetta Stone", informing us about the history of the Mansion and the life of Captain Pabst. Documents included original construction invoices and the building permit for the Mansion as well as the receipts for much of the artwork that both Captain and Mrs. Pabst had acquired. Augie also joined the Pabst Mansion board in 1995 and held the distinction of being its longest-serving active director.

Augie quietly sponsored many projects both large and small throughout the Mansion over the years, never asking for any accolades. What brought him the greatest satisfaction regarding his preservation pursuits was when other people joined him in his support of the Mansion or in celebrating a restoration or history project that had been completed. In 2003, Augie made the momentous decision to donate to the Pabst Mansion not only the trunk of Captain Pabst's papers, but several hundred items that had once come from the Pabst Mansion. His gifts included original artwork, furniture, dishes, glassware, books and even a tooled leather wastepaper basket that had belonged to the Captain. It was a tremendous gift that further established the Pabst Mansion as one of the most important and authentic historic homes in Wisconsin and the Midwest.

Augie's last visit to the Pabst Mansion came on August 3, 2024 for the Pabst family reunion dinner. I was honored to be able to acknowledge Augie for his many contributions to the Mansion's legacy. It was a beautiful evening and he greeted everyone with his trademark broad smile and he was surrounded by his extended family who had traveled from all over the country for the reunion. Augie has now passed the torch on to all of us to continue the work of preserving this special place that he loved. Our friend will be deeply missed by many and his years of generosity that helped transform the Pabst Mansion will be appreciated for generations to come.
